After settling in at our host hotel in Jersey City, NJ, our weekend began on Friday night with an amazing barnight at Ty's →







EVERYTHING OLD IS NEW AGAIN

As many of you are quite aware, Empire City MC has been through many changes over its fifty years of existence. We've had good times and we've had difficult times. We've seen the rise of the gay suffrage and liberation, the discovery and treatment for HIV/AIDS and we've gained and lost many members over our long history. Even a few "competing" clubs were founded by former ECMC members and although most of those clubs are no longer around, a few do remain - and that's a good thing! We helped create and were one of the first AMCC (Atlantic Motorcycle Coordinating Council) member clubs. We continue to promote and foster it.

ECMC may have appeared lose its way at times and some may have thought we were on the verge of extinction; however, through the efforts of some dedicated men, we've managed to keep going!

A few years ago it became apparent that ECMC was in need of a refresh. In order to accomplish this goal, we reinvented ourselves by recruiting a few new members, changing our thought processes and drafting a brand new constitution and by-laws. Some people are frightened of change but we needed it badly. With the help of existing and new members working together a massive effort was made to be more outgoing, supportive, social and to attend a variety events all over the eastern United States.

All of these changes had a strong positive effect on the club - it completely redesigned the structure of the club, putting focus upon how new members are brought in and requirements for all members and officers alike. It's really helped, and it's helped make us grow once more! Of course, the glue that binds us is our love and passion of riding motorcycles, which will always be what truly defines us.

As of this writing, we currently have eleven very active full members, three very dedicated associate members, a handful of emeritus members and many club and GDI supporters! We've been seen (and will continue to be seen) at many AMCC club events, as well as non-AMCC events. I honestly believe that each and every member is proud of our club and wears their colours with pride.

OLD SCHOOL

Since we're looking back this month, this might be the perfect time to remind some of the babyboomer generation to help "school" some of our younger tribe about how things used to be. Below are just a few examples of some of the things 'that used to be', and probably should be brought back!

Billeting - is described in the dictionary as "to provide lodging for; quarter" and was once a common expression used by members of gay MCs. Complete "strangers" would open their homes up for members of other gay MCs, even not knowing the person personally. Being a member of and wearing



a backpatch from a known gay MC was more important than a credit card is in today's times when it came to getting into private parties, some bars and more importantly, visiting other cities. Your club's backpatch were your credentials and your carte blanch when travelling. Want to visit New York City? Philadelphia? Cleveland? You could reach out to clubs in those cities and members of the club would step up to put them up for a night (or weekend) in their home! This was an inexpensive way for club members to travel, make new friends plus a fantastic way to develop inter-club camaraderie! Many of us still practice this lost art. It would be nice to see more people billeting other club members once again.

The Hanky Code - this is classic and still observed today by many! Basically, the hanky code is a colour-coded system employed usually among gay casual-sex seekers or BDSM practitioners to indicate preferred sexual fetishes, what kind of sex they are seeking, and whether they are a top/dominant or bottom/submissive. The hanky code was widely used in the 1970s and 80s by gay and bisexual men. The original list (which was far smaller than today) was included in Larry Townsend's "The Leatherman's Handbook II". In all seriousness, in a dimly lit bar with red accent lighting, it's quite difficult to distinguish "charcoal" from "grey" or "brown", so other than the original basic seven colours, it doesn't directly work; however, it's always been a great conversation-starter! You can always go up to someone sporting a hanky and ask, "What colour is that? What's it mean?"

GDI - simply put, this means "God Dammed Independent", someone who isn't a member of a club, typically one that goes to clubsponsored events such as runs or barnights who is there to have fun, but doesn't contribute to the club community by being involved.

Levi's 501 Shrink-to-Fit Jeans - If you wanted to be seen with a nice tight pair of jeans that hugged and cupped your junk, Levi's 501 Shrink-to-Fit Jeans was the only way to accomplish this back in the day, and honestly, in my opinion, is still the best! - I strive to constantly better my skill of control over my machine. I will learn its limits, and use my skill to become one with my machine so that we may keep each other alive. I am the master, it is the servant. Working together in harmony, we will become an invincible team.
- I do not fear death. I will, however, do all possible to avoid death prematurely. Fear is the enemy, not death. Fear on the highway leads to death, therefore I will not let fear be my master. I will master it.
- My machines will outlive me. Therefore, they are my legacy. I will care for them for future bikers to cherish as I have cherished them, whoever they may be.
- I do not ride to gain attention, respect, or fear from those that do NOT ride, nor do I wish to intimidate or annoy them. For those that do not know me, all I wish from them is to ignore me. For those that desire to know me, I will share with them the truth of myself, so that they might understand me and not fear others like me.
- I will never be the aggressor on the highway. However, should others mess with me, their aggression will be dealt with in as severe manner as I can cast upon them.
- I will show respect to other bikers more experienced or knowledgeable than I am. I will learn from them all I can. However, if my respect is not acknowledged or appreciated, it will end.
- I will not show disrespect to other bikers less experienced or knowledgeable than I am. I will teach them what I can. However,
 if they show me disrespect, they will be slapped.
- It will be my task to mentor new riders, that so desire, into the lifestyle of the biker, so that the breed shall continue. I shall instruct them, as I have been instructed by those before me. I shall preserve and honor traditions of bikers before me, and I will pass them on unaltered.
- I will not judge other bikers on their choice of machine, their appearance, or their profession. I will judge them only on their conduct as bikers. I am proud of my accomplishments as a biker, though I will not flaunt them to others. If they ask, I will share them.
- I will stand ready to help any other biker that truly needs my help.
- I will never ask another biker to do for me what I can do for myself.
- I am not a part-time biker. I am a biker when, and where ever I go. I am proud to be a biker, and hide my chosen lifestyle from no one. I ride because I love freedom, independence, and the movement of the ground beneath me. But most of all, I ride to better understand myself, my machine, the lands in which I ride, and to seek out and know other bikers like myself.
