EQUINOX

It was as though the Club had achieved its pinnacle of strength never before experienced in its history of existence, as Entre Nous entertained approximately 270 guests during the in-city run: Equinox '75. Letters of praise keep pouring into headquarters from other clubs throughout the U.S. and Canada, expressing thoughts of congratulations, brotherhood and support for future events.

For the Club's captain and members of the Executive Board, the success of Equinox '75 was a tribute to the new administration and its performance. The spark of P-town '74 coupled with several in-club events and gettogethers, and finally Equinox in just six short months was a great accomplishment since last September.

As for Equinox '75 itself, it was great to see so many friends from the many parts of the country as well as from Montreal and Toronto. As one Entre Nous member said, "we did our best and from what we see, the Club did it well." This Run will long be remembered as the finest in-city event ever produced in Boston.

AMCC

The Bicentennial Committee of the AMCC, otherwise known as AMCC '76 met in Boston, March 22nd and chose Atlantic City as the site of next year's biggie, the AMCC '76 Bicentennial.

The Committee updated its list of corporate directors and issued a report of its treasury. Committee members present then went on to vote on a run site. The choices were a boat cruise, a run site in upper New York state, three regional runs during the year or Atlantic City. The latter drew support from 10 clubs, while 4 votes were cast for the site in N.Y., 2 abstained and one club (Bucks MC) cast a no vote in the last ballot. The motion was made and voted to accept the majority decision. Bucks MC maintained its position and further explained that it did not feel it was in all affiliated club members best interests to have a run based on the economic situation where individuals could not afford to attend a large-scale run.

Randy of Vanguard's MC won committee praise for his AMCC '76 logo design which was accepted as the official logo that will appear on all patches, pins, stationery, etc.

The Committee met again on April 5th in Atlantic City to choose the hotel best suited for the Run. Further details will be announced by Kelly, the committee's chairman.

Entre Nous presented a check for \$270. to Kelly as its Equinox '75 run fee assessment required by the new ruling for sanctioned club runs in the AMCC.

'75 Run in Boston where council deleg-
ates also voted in Sam Johnson of the
Vikings MC as Vice-president; Ed
Nesbitt of the Druids MC, Secretary
and Jim Gress of L.I. Spuds MC, Treas-
urer.

At the same meeting, the AMCC
accepted the action taken by the Bi-
centennial Committee which approved
the Atlantic City site for 1976. The
Council also accepted for considerat-
ion the nominations of the Praetorians
and the Philadelphians as AMCC members.
That vote will take place at the next
regular AMCC meeting to be held during
the Centaur MC Run, May 16-18, 1975.

Of the votes cast for officers,
Tim Tully received 10; Sam Johnson
received 16; Ed Nesbitt received 8 and
Jim Gress received 13. Seventeen clubs
were represented.

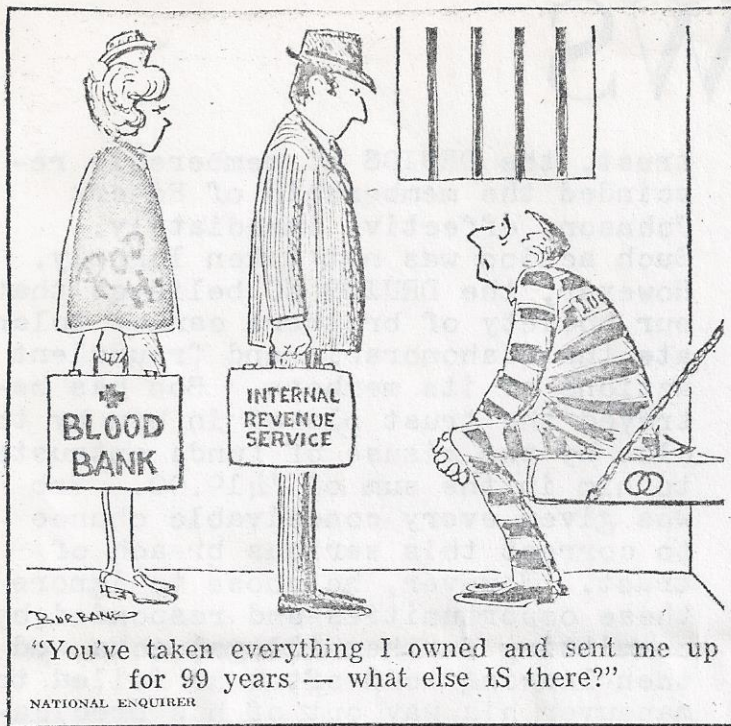
FLEA MARKET

CLUB NEWS

In Executive Board action, the officers recently sent flowers to celebrate the re-opening of Herbie's Ramrod:Room. The bar suffered smoke and water damage due to an adjacent warehouse fire. The members of the E-Board reached their decision at a meeting held on April 21st. Roy V. was appointed chairman of the Flea Market to be held on May 11th. NEW APPLICATIONS on four men were read at the last meeting held on April 22nd. They are Bob Fl, Scott R., Joe P. and Bob C.

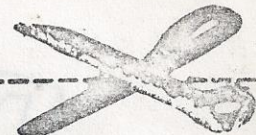
