


CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE IN SESSION

....AN EDITORIAL

Captain Joe Kirby is now the club's second leader, who succeeds ENTRE NOUS' founder and first captain, Mike Cain. Joe was born and brought up in Boston. His migrations throughout bean town brought to him many friends and acquaintances. He was first introduced to the club at a Leif Erikson run in 1972 and became Assistant Road Captain in 1973, then later appointed Road Captain to fill a vacancy. Joe has personally logged many miles in several cities at various runs and club events.



His determination and dedication to the task of everimproving the club's strength and image drew much support and the win to be elected captain at the last September meeting. He is directing an in-house cleanup of administrative affairs which includes tightening communications between the various standing committees, up-dating the associate roster and improving the club's financial strength.

Among his first priorities was the creation of the by-laws committee which is under the direction of Lieutenant Ed R., and another priority is to provide more club events and to lessen too much of a business climate. He hopes to fill the monthly calander with more fun times for all club members.

And so, the newly-appointed Constitution Committee which is led by Lieutenant Ed R., now bears the burden of searching and researching every written line of the basic by-laws in an effort to present a more concise, accurate, well-written set of rules that will leave no question unanswered under circumstances requiring a thorough interpretation.

A "new" set of properly written articles and by-laws will be a valuable asset to Entre Nous; perhaps, if the time comes for us to incorporate as a legal institution, we will be ready with the necessary charter that truly reflects the spirit and purpose of our being associated together.

If you see something which needs to be changed, now is the time to submit your thoughts to this committee.






